

Move comes after AC to DC conversion on Harbour line

RPF takes several measures to curb rooftop travelling

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Vashi: Post-April 10, upon conversion from Direct Current (DC) to Alternate Current (AC) for local trains on Harbour line, it became all the more important to highlight the ills of travelling rooftop. So, the Railway Police Force (RPF) has taken this as serious concern and approached mosques to generate awareness through announcements. Officials will opt for posters and reach out to families of those who take to stunts.

"While local trains are termed as Mumbai lifeline, it is also one of the biggest killer in the city which claims near about nine lives everyday. However, this figure too does not work as deterrence for many and youngsters perform stunts at cost of their lives. Around 150 cases of rooftop travelling were recorded and more than six have lost their lives post AC conversion of local trains on the Harbour line," said an activist.

"Along with pictorial warning and posters we have even tried to reach the youngsters parents to stop this menace which claims young lives from

the city," added an official. "The voltage of trains have increased from 16,000V to 25,000V from April 19 after the conversion which calls for increased chances of threat to lives even if they try to come near the attached wire," said a senior RPF official.

"Youngsters per for using stunts and travelling on rooftop is more common on harbour and central lines and stations like Mankhurd, Govandi on harbour line and Kaljane and beyond on Central

line is infamous for this and despite many measures and warning the youngsters don't stop," said railway activist Rajil Mezon.

"Those performing stunts don't value their life and those who are caught into performing stunts they shared that they perform the same just for sheer thrill and nothing else. The RPF officials hence, plan to reach out to their parents and school so, that they can counsel them," said Sandeep Bangare, another activist.

While keeping an eye over such incidents, the officials have tried to reach to schools in concerned areas and requested the school authorities to share safety lessons and make the kids realise the importance of life.

"Youth can overlook the posters but we feel that if announcements are done at mosques regarding this then they might listen to them and avoid performing stunts."

"A rooftop traveller if caught is fined Rs300, whereas parents of minors are called to the station to be counselled, but all these efforts go in vain as youngsters keep trying the stunts and in turn loose their lives," said the official.

Our priority is to pre-empt crime, says new top cop

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Vashi: The newly-appointed Navi Mumbai police commissioner Hemant Nagrale, (IPS, 1987) discussed his strategies to handle the crimes in the city, in a press conference yesterday Nagrale praised the city saying that it is a disciplined city.

"We will be introducing a department of undetected offences squad (UO). Rape, kidnapping, assaulting women, their safety and senior citizen issues will be the primary task handled by the squad," Nagrale said.

Nagrale earlier was a mechanical engineer before he passed his civil service exam in 1997. He has been 28 years since he has been serving in various departments like in the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF), where he served for a short period; Ramnagri super-



intendent of police (SP), including CID Pune, Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) for four-and-a-half months in bank/security and fraud. "I have worked in many well-known cases as in MPSC paper leak case and was State Intelligence Department (SID) and Additional Director General of Police (ADG) and Chief Vigilance Officer (CVO) in Mumbai," said the top cop, revealing that he also likes sports and badminton is his

favourite. He is a blackbelt in Judo and loves travelling.

"In the last five years, the police has performed well and over 60 per cent of crimes have been detected. Vehicle theft and snatching have increased. Our priority is to curb future crime. Also, we will conduct a training for cops on behaviour with and write to NMMC and CID to demanding basic facilities of toilets at police station," said the new officer.

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
